"Just hang on, let's hear what the principal will say," said Jimmy.




"Good morning, boys and girls", said the school principal Mrs. Chauke with her husky voice. "Today we have a special visitor from our local clinic to share a very important message with us. Please welcome Sister Melk."

Other kids were now starting to worry as to what the nurse would say. "Today I want to tell you about this new infectious disease called COVID-19, which is caused by a recently discovered coronavirus," said Sister Melk. "Sadly, this disease makes a lot of people around the world sick including young and old."

Now worried, Jimmy raised his hand to ask a question. "Yes, Jimmy," said Mrs. Chauke. "Sorry, Ma'am. This virus, what does it look like?" asked Jimmy, looking worried.

"Unfortunately, you can't see this virus with your naked eye. You'd need a microscope to see it. Just like in this picture, it looks like a crown with spikes at the end, you see," said Sister Melk.



"So can anyone tell me what flu symptoms you know?" asked Sister Melk.



"I often get runny nose and sore throat when I have flu," said Muzi.

"I get fever and struggle to breathe when I have flu," said Jimmy.

"You're all correct," said Sister Melk. "These are the most common flu symptoms, so if you have a fever, cough and have difficulty breathing, please talk to your parents about it. And if it gets worse, ask them to take you to the nearest clinic. Older people are more likely to have serious illness from COVID-19, so please share this information with your parents." Sister Melk also explained to the children how this virus is spread. "This virus spreads through small droplets from the mouth or nose when someone with COVID-19 coughs or exhales. These droplets land in the mouths or noses of people who are within a few meters—possibly being inhaled into their lungs. These droplets can also land on nearby objects and surfaces.

"That is why it is important to not touch your face, eyes or mouth, and to wash your hands frequently with soap and water."



Sister Melk added that it is important to keep a distance from a person who is sick.

The children were now listening attentively but also starting to worry.

Muzi raised his hand to ask a question. "I'm so scared of this virus. What can we do to protect ourselves?" he asked.



If you have to leave your home, please make sure that you wear a cloth face mask.

"You don't have to worry much. We are doing all we can to prevent the spread of this disease," said Sister Melk, adding that we can all help by practicing the following things:



Wash your hands regularly and thoroughly with clean water and soap, and avoid touching your face, hands and mouth.

Cover your mouth and nose with a bent elbow when you cough or sneeze and avoid shaking hands with or touching others.





Keep at least a 2-meter distance between yourself and others.

Stay at home. From time to time, our President will make announcements regarding this virus. At times he will ask you to stay at home and it's important that you do so.





"Thank you so much for listening to me, and please make sure you also talk to your parents if something worries you about this virus," said Sister Melk.


Mrs. Chauke took to the podium to thank Sister Melk and announce that schools would be closing for a while to minimize the risk of spreading the virus.




If you have many of the symptoms on the list, do not panic. Ask your parents to seek medical help and isolate yourself in a safe place in your home so you do not infect others.
