As the national COVID-19 lock down loomed, members of the INMED South Africa team scrambled to procure enough fish food to supply the new Aquaponics™ systems for the next several months for three cooperatives of disabled farmers in Free State. Now in Phase II, this ground-breaking project with USAID aims to prepare smallscale producers and their communities to adapt to climate change, while conserving natural resources and increasing access to economic and technical assets. The goal is to reach an additional 1000 adults, youth and school children with disabilities through online and community-based education.
